26 February 2021 THE ARC EASTERN CONNECTICUT – SERVING FAMILIES AND PEOPLE WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES FOR 69 YEARS

Good afternoon Senator Osten, Representative Walker, Senator Miner, Representative France and distinguished members of the *Appropriations Committee*:

My name is *Kathleen Stauffer* and I live in Mystic. I am Chief Executive officer of **The Arc Eastern Connecticut,** and I am testifying <u>IN SUPPORT</u> of <u>H.B. 6439</u> An Act Concerning The State Budget For The Biennium Ending June Thirtieth, 2023, And Making Appropriations Therefor.

- PLEASE KEEP PACE WITH INFLATION & REAL COSTS. The Arc ECT respectfully requests that Connecticut commit to increasing funding for its nonprofits by the full \$461 million, or 28%, by Fiscal Year 2026; we ask that \$128 million (a state net of \$67 million after federal reimbursement) be appropriated in new funding for community nonprofits in Fiscal Year 2022, a 7% increase; we request that funding be indexed to account for inflation, and that state funding keep pace with cost increases in the future. <u>And please hold nonprofits financially harmless from the impact of COVID-19!</u>
- PLEASE SUPPORT PEOPLE WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES. <u>Please support independence and self-sufficiency</u> by reinvesting the proposed savings of \$4.1 million allowing approximately 300 people served by DDS to transition Individual Supported Employment Services from group-supported employment or day services. Please reinvest in DDS the proposed savings of \$2.3 million from funding reductions in the Behavioral Service. <u>Please ensure that the proposed savings of \$1 million in each fiscal year from closing one public Community Living Arrangement is reinvested to serve people with I/DD.</u>
- 3. PLEASE SUPPORT OUR COVID HEROES! Please provide <u>hazard pay for essential worker-heroes</u> on the front lines; **Please acknowledge by passing this bill that procuring Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and cleaning supplies is difficult and extremely expensive.**
 - The Arc ECT managed to m<u>eet all participant and family needs in new and creative ways</u> by rapidly pivoting to new and innovative service models not previously designed or used.
 - The Arc ECT protected the people and families it serves as well as its team of nearly 500 employees effectively with no funding initially for protective equipment.
 - The Arc ECT <u>worked with the CDC, the State of Connecticut and CT's DDS constantly</u> reviewing and revising service models and protective measure alike to meet all federal and state requirements as they rapidly and necessarily evolved.

- 4. WHO WE ARE. The Arc ECT is a 69-year-old, grassroots agency in Eastern Connecticut founded by families looking for NON-INSTITUTIONAL opportunities for loved ones.
- 5. WHO WE SERVE. The Arc ECT serves 900+ people with IDD in Eastern Connecticut with a constituent network of more than 2,500 voters. Services range from residential to in-home supports to employment services. The Arc's Community Life & Advocacy program, funded by public events and United Way of SE CT, provides critical respite to 200+ adults and families, support groups for survivors of domestic violence and sexual abuse, Special Olympics and rides to the polls so people with IDD can vote.
- 6. JOBS. The Arc ECT employs more than 440 adults contributing more than \$9,000,000 in wages to EASTERN CT's economy. <u>Nearly 30% of employees are minorities and 72.7% are women.</u>
- ECONOMIC IMPACT. The Arc ECT spends \$1.5 million each year on gasoline, fuel oil, groceries, office supplies, hardware, furniture and health insurance alone and is a leader in advocating for the economic well-being of Connecticut.
